

This year's Science Week went off with a bang!


Our Year 7, 8 and 9 pupils worked hard to produce posters around this year's theme of 'Time'. These were displayed in the Science corridor.
















Art & Design

Year 7 Batik Cushion

Year 7 Textiles pupils have been working hard this term to create their very own cushions. They have been using a variety of textiles techniques such as Batik, fabric dying, hand embroidery, tacking and embellishment. Pupils learnt how Batik hot wax is used to create resists on fabric, allowing the designer to use a variety of colours. As part of the Textiles unit, pupils also learnt about three different repeat patterns and used that knowledge to design their own repeat pattern cushion inspired by the theme of Nature.

The pupils have done a great job, and the cushions are ready to take home in time for the Easter holiday.




Year 8 Hand Embroidered Tote Bags

This term Year 8 Textiles pupils have been learning all about hand embroidery techniques. Pupils have successfully learnt how to do the following hand embroidery stitches; Back, Running, Satin, Blanket, and Chain.

Once pupils had mastered their stitching skills, they then had to design a Tote bag using the theme 'Animal or Transport'. On their designs pupils had to try and incorporate as many stitches as possible to evidence that they had mastered each one. Pupils then had to begin manufacturing the bag. They have learnt how to manufacture straps from a piece of fabric, how to use a sewing machine, how to create a rolled hem and how to remove frayed edges.

All pupils have worked hard and supported one another to complete each stage of manufacture. Here are some examples of the bag designs including a very special one from Mason S, 8J2 who decided to make his tote bag for his mother to honour her dog that sadly passed away. He took great pride in creating this special gift.


KS5 Digital Media - Digital Products


Modern Foreign Languages (MFL)

Promoting Languages


On 23 January, two Year 8 French and Spanish classes joined a number of Hackney schools in an online event highlighting the importance of languages after education. Pupils heard from three experienced members of the civil service, hailing from a variety of backgrounds and speaking a plethora of languages.

This event provided an opportunity to hear first-hand how languages can open doors to new cultures and career paths, providing crucial transferable skills that can be used both inside and outside of the workplace. The talks were followed by a O&A with the speakers who explained how pursuing languages had led them to positive life changing opportunities. Speakers represented the British Council and European Council (speaking French, Spanish and working with South American countries), The Ministry for Justice (speaking French, Spanish and Punjabi) and the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (speaking French, Spanish, Korean).

Geography

Year 11 Geographers Complete their Urban Geography Fieldwork Investigation

On 1 March, Year 11 Geographers carried out some fieldwork in the local area. We wanted to try and find out if quality of life in Manor House was improving because of the Woodberry Down regeneration. Our secondary research was based on a newspaper's research, data from the 2021 Census, and statistics from the Metropolitan Police. We used this to formulate a hypothesis - that 'Quality of life in the Manor House area had not improved significantly since the Woodberry Down regeneration'.

We discovered just how difficult it is to find and approach members of the public in order to deliver a questionnaire to them! Our Year 11 pupils handled this superbly however, and together with their own observations and field sketches, they managed to gather enough data to come to a valid conclusion.

When we analysed the results, we were surprised to find that our hypothesis was disproved and we came to the conclusion that, of those questioned, life in the Manor House area had improved in some ways since the regeneration.

Round 3

Round 3 of the tournament saw Skinners' beat Mossbourne 2-1 in a tight local derby. Mossbourne went ahead early in the game, however Skinners' were playing the ball around nicely, and looking the better team. This was rewarded with a foul on Ioan A, and a penalty to Skinners'. Unfortunately, the penalty was missed but this didn't deter Skinners'. Some good work from Alex A led to a half volley for Ngoy N who buried it, to bring the scores level. Half time 1-1. In the second half, Skinners' were in control but struggling to create too many clear cut chances. Their persistence paid off with a stunning curling strike from Ngoy N into the far corner from outside the box, putting Skinners' 2-1 up. The defence was solid throughout and comfortably saw the game out, with a man of the match performance from Hermon D.

Round 4

Skinners' opponents for Round 4 were Prendergast Ladywell School (PL). Despite being without key players Kymani SD and Ioan A, the team raised their game when needed to complete another good victory. The game started evenly with a few chances for both teams, and then a good strike from PL to go 1-0 up. Skinners' responded with a first goal of the season from defender Stephen A from a corner. Skinners' grew into the game and were playing well when half time came. In the second half a strike from Ngoy N was saved, with the rebound put away by Keanu C to put Skinners 2-1 up. PL fought back and drew themselves level with another great strike from outside the box. However, Skinners' dug deep and pushed for a winner; this came with 10 minutes to go with an excellent finish into the corner from captain Ngoy N. Skinners' then soaked up 10 minutes of pressure to see out a well-deserved win, at times defending for their lives, as the home team were roared on by a very noisy home support. The game ended in victory for Skinners' beating PL 3-2. Man of the match Ngoy N.

Semi-Finals

The highly anticipated Semi-Final of the tournament is where Skinners' winning streak was unfortunately brought to an end. Skinners' travelled to Chiswick for the match against Fulham Boys. The game started evenly with some good skill on show by both sides. Fulham scored first with a cross and header into the far corner, however Skinners' quickly fought back with a free kick from Kymani SD going over the keeper and straight into the net. The game then ebbed and flowed, with both teams battling hard, showing quality, and cancelling each other out. Half time 1-1. In the second half, Skinners' managed to get in front from some good anticipation and finishing from Kymani SD. Skinners' were then in control of the game, until a goal against the run of play from Fulham leveled the game. Skinners' fought hard, with every single player working for the team (despite an injury, and a player being sin binned), through the rest of the game with a couple of excellent late saves from Jacob S.

The game went straight to penalties: Skinners' started well with Hussein P scoring first, however Fulham slotted home four excellent penalties, giving Jacob S trouble in goal. Skinners' unfortunately missed two, to eventually lose 4-1 on penalties.

A massive congratulations to all of the boys for showing excellent skill, determination and togetherness throughout this cup run. It is the furthest any Skinners' team has ever got in the tournament, and they have done the school and themselves proud!
